## Pronouns

A pronoun is a word that takes the place of a proper noun. They help us avoid repetition of the nouns.
e.g. The children played in the park. The children came home early.

The children played in the park. They came home early.
The words 'the children' were changed to 'they' to make it less repetitive.

## A or An ${ }^{\text {x }}$

To know whether to use a or an, it is important to know the difference between vowels and consonants. If the following word starts with a vowel, we use 'an'. If the following word starts with a consonant, we use 'a'.

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## Why is it a unique, not an unique?

Most of the time, we add ' $a$ ' before words that start with consonants and 'an' before words that start with a vowel. However, which would you use in this sentence?

The boy had a/an unique talent.
In this sentence the article used should be ' $a$ ' as the ' $u$ ' in unique is making the consonant sound $/ y /$. If the first letter of a word makes a consonant sound, you place ' $a$ ' before it but, if the first letter of a word makes a vowel sound, you place 'an' before the word.
